

Citing a Newsela Article (adapted from newsela.org and updated 8/29/17)

When citing articles on Newsela, you need to be aware of the article's level. There are two ways of thinking about the levels of the articles on Newsela. The **MAX level** is, more or less, the original piece. The **levels below Max**, are adapted or rewritten versions that are easier for students to comprehend. They may have less words or less difficult words, but the Newsela staff works hard to get the same message across and to hold onto the most important details from the original article.

When citing the **Max level**, you will check the byline (usually under the article title) to find the original author's name. This version may be edited slightly, but it is largely the original source. Therefore, **Edited by Newsela Staff** is the phrasing that we recommend in a works cited.

The **other levels below MAX** are the levels you would choose according to your current reading level. Because these levels are changed to fit the reading level, you would use the word **adapted** instead of **edited**. When citing an article below the max level, **Adapted by Newsela Staff** is the phrasing that we recommend in a works cited.

When referencing a Newsela article at Max Level in MLA format, use the following format:

Original Author's Last Name, First Name, and Additional Author. "Title of Article." *Title of Newspaper via Newsela*. Edited by Newsela Staff, Version Lexile, Date published, <URL>.

When citing a Newsela article below Max Level, use the following format:

Beaumont, Thomas, and Julie Pace. "VP Debate: Kaine and Pence fight for their running mates." *Associated Press via Newsela*. Edited by Newsela Staff, Version 1190, 5 Oct. 2016, <https://newsela.com/articles/pence-kaine-vp-debate/id/22542/>.
